# ECMI-USA & NHI Growing Together

In 1971 an organization named New Hope International (NHI) began supporting Christian leaders behind the iron curtain. After the fall of Communism they began to focus on equipping local churches within Eastern Europe for ministry. Today they are integrating into ECMI-USA.

"NHI has had an exciting history of serving the Lord in Eastern Europe," says George Brown, Director of ECMI-USA. "Their desire to collaboratively strengthen and establish local churches as they take the love of Christ into their neighborhoods and nations, and to reach the next generation for Christ makes them a perfect match for ECM."

Much work has been done to ensure that the missions and visions of the two mission agencies are compatible. Once the integration of NHI into ECMI-USA is complete, European Christian Mission International will grow by 10%.

Currently NHI focuses on ministries in Bulgaria,

Ukraine, Romania and Hungary. Its largest work is in Ukraine where nearly two-thirds of its 900 volunteers live. They offer pre-marital and family ministry, public school outreach initiatives, youth work, a large orphan and foster care program, and they had more than 19,000 people enrolled in their Bible Correspondence Course in 2014. One of ECM's missionaries to Poland, Saško Nezamutdinov, came through this very

program.

These initiatives were recognized by Rev. Vyacheslav Nesteruk, head of the Baptist Union of Ukraine from 2006-2014, when he wrote: "You seek to be 'on the front line,' addressing the most difficult social and spiritual problems of Ukrainian society.

You have led the way in demonstrating that a vital relationship with Jesus Christ is the only way a person can be truly forgiven and whole... By modeling and by your excellent presentations in public schools and universities, as well as through your Bible correspondence courses, our partnership with you is giving the members of our 2,800 local churches throughout Ukraine the understanding that we can reach out into our society to share the love of Christ with those who might never otherwise attend a church service of any kind."

One such example is Sasha Pavelchuk. By the time he was in fifth grade he was already smoking, skipping classes and drinking. In high school he began taking drugs and was soon addicted. Then he met a man, an NHI worker who said he had also been addicted to drugs -- until he met Jesus. Sasha began attending a weekly meeting this worker led. Eventually Sasha prayed to God to take away his desire for drugs. Sasha recalls, "God started working right away. I felt miserable after each use. It wasn't long before I asked Jesus to forgive my sins, and He gave me freedom from the drug addiction without any medicine, rehabilitation, or withdrawal!" Today Sasha is leading NHI's ministry in a university city, pastoring a church, ministering to local gypsy communities and reaching out to teenagers and young adults.

British missionary Roland Smith is coordinating NHI's integration with ECM at the field level. "Each time I meet another NHI worker I get more excited," he says. "They're dedicated and experienced men and women who understand their own cultures and local contexts, and desperately want people to come to Jesus. Plus, they love the church just like we do in ECM. Perfect!"

# Refugees: Crisis or Opportunity

"Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." Romans 15:7 ESVUK

Reports of the refugee crisis in Europe continue to dominate the news. There are estimates

that 4.1 million registered Syrian refugees live in places like Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Egypt (CNN). Many of those refugees have more recently been flooding the

entry points of Europe through Turkey and Greece. But what is tearing at the hearts of those around the world are images of young



children, mothers and the elderly who in their attempts to find their way to places of peace and prosperity in Europe, end their lifeless journeys washed up on the beaches of some foreign soil.

The story of the refugee is not a new one. ECMI missionary Vimal Vimalasekaran has been working among refugees in Germany for several

decades now. As Vimal likes to say, "Jesus was himself a refugee!" Vimal himself came to Christ in a refugee camp. He and his wife Louise have a real heart for those displaced by war, pestilence and poverty. While the rest of Europe struggles to know what to do with this new wave of refugees, Germany is prepared to receive nearly 500,000 this year alone (The Guardian). Vimal and Louise are strategically positioned to minister

to these refugees whose initial entry point is the refugee center in Karlsruhe.

However, countries like Greece and Hungary are struggling to know how to deal with this current surge. ECMI missionaries are on the ground assessing the situation and exploring ways to take advantage of this opportunity where people are open to the message of hope that the Gospel of Jesus Christ offers.

ECMI is uniquely positioned to help and assist the churches of Eastern and Western Europe minister to this new influx of refugees and believers. ### **ORPHAN CARE CAMP**

Ukraine "We were ready to give up and send the boy we had fostered for three years back to the orphanage," reported one parent. "However, during these several days we spent in the camp, God worked in our hearts and we changed our minds. We really felt an atmosphere of care and love. The lectures and workshops for parents and

The Orphan Care Camp brings together the families who have adopted or are fostering orphans. For two weeks they study together

and participate in program activities. The goal is to create a warm and family atmosphere for the children as well as for parents.

When families gathered on the first day of camp, they hugged each other in greeting and cried, because they had been looking forward to seeing

each other again after the good experience of previous years. New families that joined the Orphan Care program were surprised to see so many other Christian foster families.

The children were involved in various activities, games, competitions, and performances presented and prepared by the team of New Hope volunteers. They had Bible lessons where they were told about God and the Christian life.

Parents were blessed by the training seminars, led by David Little from the USA. These were a time of active discussions and sharing both difficult and happy upbringing experiences in foster families. Morning Bible class groups discussed the message from the previous evening.



Every camp day ended with the evening program. The kids shared what they had done during the day and there was a message from the Gospel.

The Orphan Care Camp has become the time and place to make new friends, find answers to many questions, and simply enjoy the time together in the family called New Hope. # CONFIRMATION CAMP

Gottlund, Sweden

The church in Sweden is a state church. Confirmation is a sacrament in which historically all teenagers have participated as a

witness of God's grace and good will in their lives. Participants confirm their infant baptism as the bishop lays on his hands, conferring spiritual strength and wisdom.

Since the 1970's, however, fewer and fewer youth have decided to be confirmed, and those that do have a very nominal connection to Christianity. In much of Sweden, the process has become a partycentered rite of passage into adulthood.

The church in which the Ashmens minister piggy-backs on the cultural tradition and hosts a two-week Bible camp. Over thirty youth attended this

year's camp. Jesse taught 27 hours of Bible to the young adults. Instead of following the suggested lectures on the significance of candles, symbols, and clothing

found in the church, he began with the assumption that none of the youth had a Theistic worldview. Together with summer intern, Amelia Seefeldt, Jesse packed those hours with outdoor initiatives, orienteering challenges, and apologetic lectures.

Some lectures came across better than others. Teaching about sexual purity was still an uphill battle, for instance. Jesse's and Krista's testimony about sexual integrity and marital commitment came across like a plea to embrace a flat-earth. Even other pastors were dumbfounded.

By the end of the two weeks, however, the response was fruitful: Salvations, baptisms, and continued discipleship.

a camp for Third Culture Kids

The children of missionaries, missionary kids (MKs) have a unique childhood. They grow up in a culture to which they do not belong, yet they do not feel like they belong in their own culture either. They are a unique cultural blend, with a sense of rootlessness; they are Third Culture Kids (TCK).

Rachel Whitaker knows what it is like to struggle as a TCK. As the



daughter of ECM missionaries Ron and Brenda Anderson, she grew up in Spain. Now as a missionary herself with ECM, she and husband BJ care for the missionary kids of ECMI as part of their job.

One of the ways that they have done this is to organize a retreat for the teenagers. So for a week this summer they had a blast with 11 MKs together. It was an intense week with daily worship and Bible



study times, lots of food, several outings including a zipline circuit and a water park.

Jesus worked

in several young people in different ways. But the thing heard most was how significant it was for them to spend time together as friends and MKs, because of their deep sense of belonging to each other.
